	Owl box: Roger reported that there have been owls in the box this spring. He and Toni heard the chicks and Roger saw the mother at 4am one morning. It was concluded that it was a good thing that the owl box hadn't been moved as suggested at last year's AGM		
4.	REPORT FROM THE CHAIRMAN, CLIVE ATKINS		
	Clive pointed out that if the FoKW wishes to change its objectives then the AGM is a good time to do so.		
	Rosemary pointed out that according to the actions from last year's AGM, we should have changed the wording in the Constitution. It had been agreed last year that we should emphasise the educational element and it was decided that, under Our Objectives Item 1, the wording be changed from "potential educational value" to "facilitate educational opportunities". 	Clive described how the FoKW operates: The committee meets 4 times a year with		
	Gary in attendance. We hold Volunteer Sessions 4 times a year on Sundays during		
	which we work in the wood. Dependent on the time of year, we carry out the		
	following tasks: planting, clearing nettles, litter picking and removing dead and dying		
	trees. There have also been ad hoc mid-week sessions with Gary which have actually		
	resulted in a great deal of work being achieved and new volunteers "signed up". How		
	do people find out about these ad hoc sessions when Gary is available? By their very		
	nature, since they are dependent on the availability of both Gary and the equipment,		
	they have to be organised at short notice, which is not ideal, but at least it gives		
	volunteers a choice of mid-week or weekend activities.		
	Chris suggested that we could send out a text to people if we have their mobile numbers or an email if we have their email addresses. It was pointed out that sometimes only a few people are needed for a task. This could be inefficient because we would have too many people turning up - not a worthwhile use of their time.		
	The Children's Event was moved to the middle of the school autumn half term which has resulted in a good number of children attending.		
	We have been clearing holly. Clive saw a fox and the children saw a muntjak deer in the wood. We have taken out rhododendron, sycamore, holly, nettles and, using the		

chipper, we have been able to put the chips down on wet sections of the path. There's still work to do at the north end of the wood. Clive emphasised the need for balance; Knolls Wood is not a park. Clive then projected a list of achievements. When Paul Burgess (Central Bedfordshire Council Green Spaces Officer) visited he said that it would be acceptable to clear up to 5 metres each side of the path. We have planted a Red Oak but there is not enough space in the canopy to plant any more trees at the moment. There is a lot of growth from naturally self-seeded trees. Clive felt that the last Management Plan was a bit general but John Creasey pointed out that the plan is guidance.

Our website is important for preserving archives; it has also been instrumental in terms of finding new volunteers. We worry that we are perceived as a clique so we want to invite others to participate.

The Facebook page does generate interest in the wood. We tend to attract youngsters but lose them after a certain age. John Creasey pointed out that the same happens with the activities the Rangers offer at Stockgrove.

If we want to extend our Volunteer Sessions it will be good to know what the tasks are and to call upon a "pool" of volunteers. We also need to keep a sensible safe ratio of volunteers to experts.

John suggested we have another walk round the wood with Gary to identify what needs to be done and then find the volunteers. We are limited by the budget which CBC can give us (ie how many hours of Gary's time we can have). John Creasey reported that the budget is guaranteed till next March. If we work without a ranger there are insurance issues.

It was pointed out that we have an ageing committee and ageing volunteers so we need to find younger volunteers. It was suggested that maybe we could knock on doors. We need to think about how we are going to get new members.

Jenny's suggestion of an activity involving a walk around the wood could be a good start. Bedfordshire Wildlife Trust has asked Chris to do a walk/talk round Knolls Wood so maybe we could advertise something like this.

Mick Hewett suggested placing an advert for such a walk in the local paper; it could also be advertised up at Rushmere. Maybe early autumn. Late September/early October. This is to be discussed at the next committee meeting,

Maybe if we ask ourselves why we all got involved this might help. A newcomer to the area said that finding out that there was a group which managed the wood made him decide to volunteer. It was decided that we should try to organise an event which will be aimed at adults.

All present praised Roger for his suggestion to attach a small box to the Sandy Lane notice board to hold copies of our newsletters. The newsletters seem popular. It was decided that we should purchase another box for the Plantation Road notice board.

The committee will arrange to walk round the wood with Gary to identify tasks which need to be done

A new list of tasks will be drawn up

The committee will discuss arranging an event in the autumn which will appeal to adults

The committee will purchase another box for newsletters

5. REPORT FROM THE TREASURER, ROGER SELDON

Roger distributed the accounts for 2017- 2018. He said that all funds are now held in the Nationwide account not the Coop. There is not much to report: we are currently in a healthy financial position so there is no need to ask for funding at the moment. Virtually all our expenditure is for communication - newsletters etc. Roger thanked everyone for their support through the Waitrose green token scheme. Gary supplies the equipment needed for Volunteer sessions so our annual outgoings are pretty modest. In terms of website maintenance, Roger pointed out that John Foreman is very generous with his time; he is very concerned about Nature so he is happy to maintain our website at a discounted rate. Claire is our conduit so all communication with John should be through her.

The accounts were accepted and those present thanked Roger for his ongoing work as Treasurer.

All other committee members are happy to continue. Martin volunteered to attend the next committee meeting to find out how he can help out.
